Contemporaries of Gautama Buddha

King Bimbisara

- **Role:** King of Magadha, one of Buddha's earliest royal patrons.

King Ajatashatru

Ananda

- **Role:** Buddha's cousin and personal attendant, a key disciple.
- **Details:** Accompanied Buddha for 25 years, memorizing his teachings; played a role in the First Buddhist Council.

Sariputta (Shariputra)

- **Role:** Chief disciple, renowned for wisdom.
