#### **Central Schemes**

- **Definition**: Fully funded and implemented by the Central Government.
- Funding: 100% funding from the Union Government.
- **Implementation**: Executed directly by central ministries or agencies.
- Examples:
  - Pradhan Mantri Jan Dhan Yojana (PMJDY)
  - Ayushman Bharat Yojana (PM-JAY)
  - PM Surya Ghar Muft Bijli Yojana

#### Centrally Sponsored Schemes (CSS)

- **Definition**: Jointly funded by the Central and State Governments, with states contributing a share.
- **Funding**: Shared between Centre and States (e.g., 60:40, 90:10 for special category states, or other ratios).
- **Implementation**: States implement with central guidelines and oversight.
- Examples:
  - Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana (PMAY)
  - National Health Mission (NHM)
  - Pradhan Mantri Krishi Sinchayee Yojana (PMKSY)

# AGRICULTURE AND RURAL DEVELOPMENT

# PRADHAN MANTRI KISAN SAMMAN NIDHI (PM-KISAN)

Direct income support for small and marginal farmers to meet agricultural and household expenses.

#### Objectives/Aim:

- Augment farmer family income for agricultural/allied activities.
- Support procurement of inputs for crop health and yields.
- Enhance financial stability, reducing informal credit dependence.

Functioning under: Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare

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#### **Notes**



Launched on: February 24, 2019 (effective from December 1, 2018)

Type: Central Scheme

#### **Salient Features:**

- ₹6,000/year per eligible farmer family in three ₹2,000 instalments via DBT.
- Eligibility: Landholding farmers (≤2 hectares); excludes institutional landholders, high-income families, government officials/pensioners (>₹10,000/month pension).
- State/UTs identify beneficiaries; self-registration via PM-KISAN portal.
- 100% centrally funded (~₹75,000 crore annually).
- Aadhaar-seeded bank accounts mandatory.

#### **Expected Outcomes:**

- Improve liquidity for inputs and household needs.
- Cover 14.5 crore farmers, boosting rural economy.
- Promote agricultural modernization, reduce moneylender reliance.

#### Targets Achieved:

- 12 crore farmers benefited by February 2025; 19th instalment disbursed ₹20,000 crore to ~9 crore farmers.
- Cumulative disbursal >₹2.8 lakh crore by 2024.

#### Other Important Information:

- Modeled on Telangana's Rythu Bandhu; praised by World Bank for DBT efficiency.
- Uses e-KYC, PM-KISAN portal for transparency; includes grievance redressal and fund recovery mechanisms.

**UPSC Note**: Aligns with Doubling Farmers' Income (DFI) goal; monitor annual disbursal data and state-wise coverage for prelims/mains.

#### Criticism:

- Exclusion errors: Only 21% eligible farmers in UP, Haryana, Rajasthan benefited in some surveys.
- Excludes landless/tenant farmers without land records.
- ₹6,000/year insufficient amid rising input costs.
- Delays in verification/fund disbursal in some states.

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### PRADHAN MANTRI FASAL BIMA YOJANA (PMFBY)

Crop insurance against losses from natural calamities, pests, and diseases.

#### Objectives/Aim:

- Financial support for crop losses from unforeseen events.
- Stabilize farmer income for continuity in farming.
- Encourage modern agricultural practices and technologies.
- Ensure credit flow to agriculture.

Functioning under: Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare

**Launched on**: January 13, 2016 (effective Kharif 2016; revamped as PMFBY 2.0 from Kharif 2020)

Type: Centrally Sponsored Scheme

#### **Salient Features:**

- Premium rates: 2% (Kharif), 1.5% (Rabi), 5% (commercial/horticultural crops).
- Covers natural calamities, pests, diseases, and post-harvest losses (e.g., cyclones).
- Voluntary since Kharif 2020; uses remote sensing, drones, satellite imagery for loss assessment.
- Premium subsidies shared by Centre and States; Assam fully subsidizes for ≤1 hectare.
- Meri Policy Mere Hath campaign for doorstep policy delivery.

#### **Expected Outcomes:**

- Reduce financial vulnerability to crop failures.
- Enhance food security via stable production.
- Promote high-yield/innovative crops through risk mitigation.

#### **Targets Achieved:**

- 5 crore farmers insured annually; claims worth thousands of crores disbursed.
- ₹1.45 lakh crore claims settled by 2023; Assam covers crops like Sali Paddy, Jute.

#### Other Important Information:

 Replaced NAIS and Modified NAIS; budget ~₹16,000 crore (FY 2021-22).

#### **Notes**

Revamped in 2020 for efficiency and transparency.

# PRADHAN MANTRI KRISHI SINCHAYEE YOJANA (PMKSY)

Enhance irrigation coverage and water use efficiency for sustainable agriculture.

#### Objectives/Aim:

- Expand assured irrigation ("Har Khet ko Pani").
- Improve on-farm water efficiency ("More Crop Per Drop").
- Promote precision irrigation (drip/sprinkler systems).
- Integrate water source development, distribution, and management.

Functioning under: Ministry of Jal Shakti

Launched on: July 1, 2015

Type: Centrally Sponsored Scheme

#### Salient Features:

- Components: AIBP, Har Khet Ko Pani, Watershed Development, Per Drop More Crop.
- 55% subsidy for small farmers (<2 hectares) for microirrigation; 45% for others.
- Interest-free loans (first 2 years, repayable over 5 years).
- IWMP subsumed in 2015; outlay ~₹50,000 crore (2015-20).
- Converges with MGNREGS for water conservation.

#### **Expected Outcomes:**

- Increase irrigated land for higher productivity and incomes.
- Minimize water wastage, enhance yields.
- Attract private investment in irrigation; promote sustainable water use.





#### Targets Achieved:

- 50 lakh hectares under micro-irrigation by 2023.
- 99 AIBP projects progressed; 6,000+ villages benefited from watershed projects by 2024.

#### **Other Important Information:**

- Tagline: "More Crop Per Drop."
- Focuses on climate-resilient agriculture, groundwater recharge.

- Slow implementation due to Centre-State coordination issues.

## PRIME MINISTER DHAN-DHAANYA KRISHI YOJANA

Enhance agricultural output and incomes in low-productivity districts.

#### Objectives/Aim:

- Improve productivity in 3,000 low-yield districts.
- Increase farmer incomes via modern techniques/inputs.
- Promote sustainable, climate-resilient farming.
- Reduce regional agricultural disparities.

Functioning under: Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare

Launched on: July 2025 (Union Budget 2025)

**Type:** Centrally Sponsored Scheme

#### **Salient Features:**

- Targets 3,000 low-productivity districts.
- Subsidies for high-yield seeds, fertilizers, equipment.
- Promotes climate-resilient crops, organic farming.
- Integrates with Digital Agriculture Mission for tech solutions.
- Training and extension services for farmers.





- Boost crop yields and incomes in underperforming districts.
- Strengthen food security via higher production.

Launched on: July 2025 (Union Budget 2025)

Type: Centrally Sponsored Scheme

#### **Salient Features:**

- Focus on high-yield oilseed varieties, hybrid seeds.

- Promote sustainable, climate-resilient pulse farming.
- Ensure nutritional security via affordable pulses.

Functioning under: Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare

Launched on: July 2025 (Union Budget 2025)

Type: Centrally Sponsored Scheme

#### **Salient Features:**

- Subsidies for high-yield pulse seeds, fertilizers.
- Training/extension services for farmers.
- Promotes intercropping, crop rotation for soil fertility.
- Integrates with Digital Agriculture Mission for precision farming.
- Develops storage/market linkages for pulses.

 Focus on rural infrastructure (roads, electricity, water) in backward regions.

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Skill development, entrepreneurship for youth/women.

Notes

- Supports climate-resilient agriculture, disaster preparedness.
- Integrates with MGNREGS, PMAY-Rural, Digital Agriculture Mission.
- Financial support for cooperatives, SHGs.

#### NATIONAL FOOD SECURITY MISSION (NFSM)

- Restore soil fertility, farm-level productivity.
- Promote improved agronomic practices/technologies.
- Ensure food security, self-sufficiency in food grains.

Functioning under: Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare

**Launched on:** October 2007 (revised targets in subsequent years)

**Type:** Centrally Sponsored Scheme

**Salient Features:**

- Targets rice, wheat, pulses, coarse cereals, commercial crops (sugarcane, cotton, jute).
- Financial assistance for seeds, machinery, irrigation.

Launched on: April 2005 (subsumed under MIDH in 2014)

Type: Centrally Sponsored Scheme

#### **Salient Features:**

- Targets fruits, vegetables, flowers, spices, medicinal plants, plantation crops.
- Financial assistance for nurseries, tissue culture, greenhouses.
- Supports cold storage, pack houses, market linkages.
- Cluster-based approach; funding split: 60:40 (general states), 90:10 (NE states).

#### **Expected Outcomes:**

- Double horticulture production, farmer incomes.
- Reduce post-harvest losses; boost exports.
- Enhance nutritional security.

#### Targets Achieved:

- Horticulture production ~320 MT by 2022-23, surpassing food grains.

- Promotes bamboo plantations on agricultural/non-forest
- Financial assistance for nurseries, plantations, processing units.
- Supports 10 bamboo clusters for value-added products.
- Training for farmers/artisans; outlay ~₹1,290 crore (2018-20).

- Increase bamboo cultivation, reduce timber imports.
- Generate employment for ~1 lakh farmers/artisans.
- Promote eco-friendly products, carbon sequestration.

- Uses drones, IoT, satellite imagery for crop monitoring.
- Integrates with e-NAM for market access.
